Winner of the 9-hole contest, 27 holes played on three days, was Mrs. Jean Blumenthal with a 155 total.

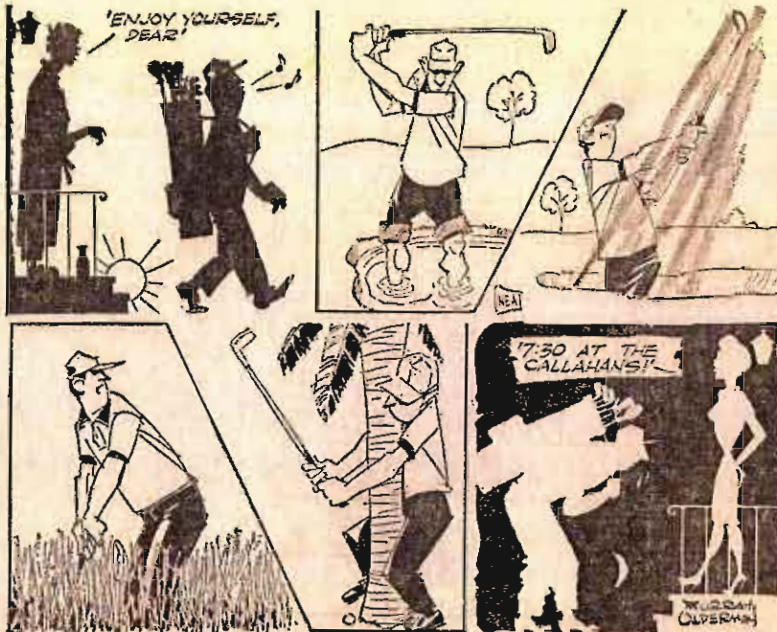

Hastings high school and Hastings College athletes are slated for dual meets next week. St. Cecilia opened the 1964 campaign last Thursday and have several other matches on tap.

Among the golfing highlights this year will be the first annual Women's City Tourna-

ment, which will be held the weekend of June 24 and 25.

Participants must hold an adult membership in one of the three Hastings golf clubs for the tourney scheduled to open at Meadowbrook. In 1965 the affair will be at Lochland and Southern Hills will be the host in 1966.

Representatives from each club are serving on the planning committee, including Mrs. Jim Conway, Mrs. Sterling Tuck, Mrs. Robert Hunter and Mrs. Art Williams.

Lochland's Women have scheduled an opening breakfast for 9:30 a.m. Tuesday and coffee and group golf lessons will be conducted through April 28.

At Meadowbrook the ladies have set April 16 for their opening breakfast and regular play will get underway on the 23.

Gals at Southern Hills have planned an organizational meeting for 9:30 a.m. on April 21 and mixed play will start on April 28. A spring party for men and women is on tap for April 18.

Meadowbrook's Open Tournament is set for May 22 and 23, with various other stags, two-ball foursomes, smaller tournaments and practice ses-

sions on the docket through September.

A family picnic on July 4 and the awards dinner and dance on September 12, also are big affairs at Meadowbrook.

Southern Hills has planned its annual Open Tournament for July 26. Stags, handicaps and other tourneys also highlight the season. The Awards Banquet is an October 10 affair.

Lochland Country Club has a busy agenda, including various two and four-ball gatherings, stags, a club tournament and at least two different exchange invitations.

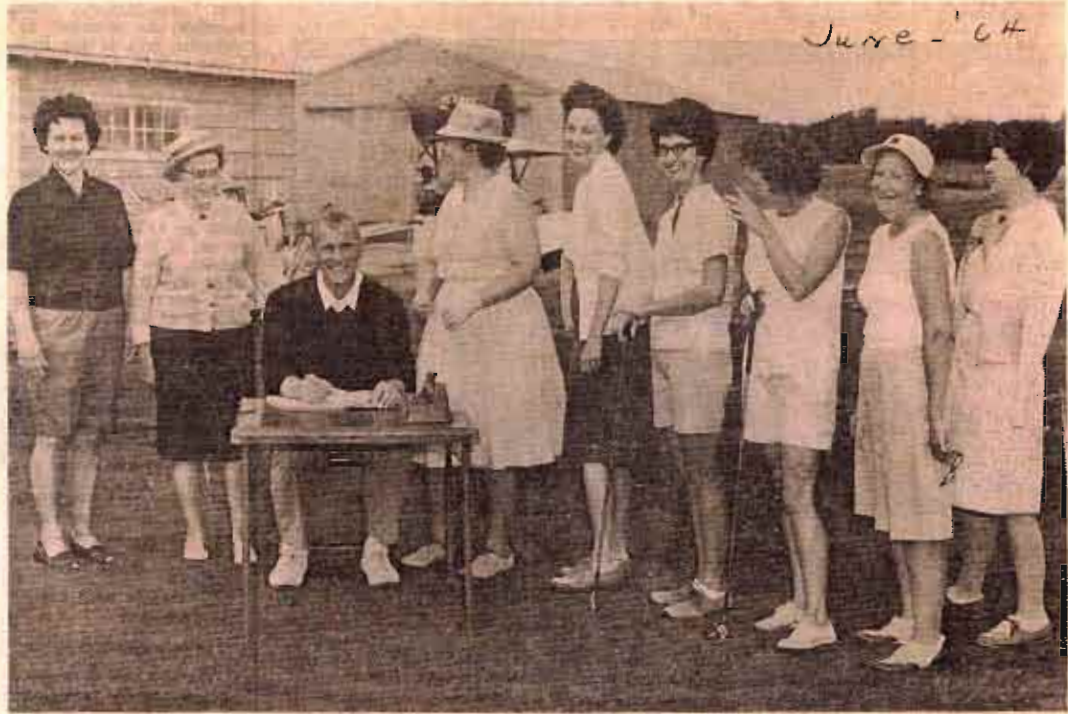

Tee-off time will be between 7 and 10 a.m. each day of the

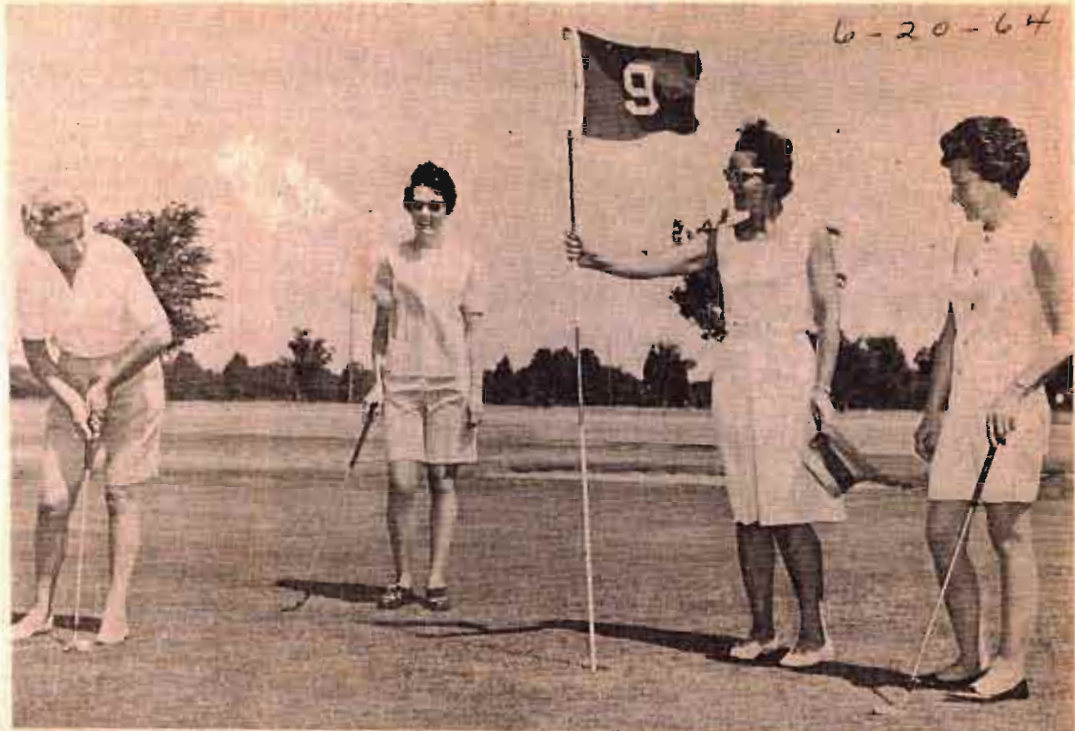
tourney. Coffee, rolls and sandwiches will be available at all times.
