Young 'veteran' holds off charge of 17-year-old in first round

Lochland Country Club — Young veteran Christie Travnicek had to fight for her life in a first round match in the 57th annual Nebraska Women's State Golf Championships here Wednesday afternoon in a match that will be long remembered for its superb olay.

for its superb play.

Mrs. Travnicek, three time winner in this tournament from 1969-71. defeated, outlasted might be a better word, 17-year-old Nan Circo, Omaha, one-up after 22 holes. And she did it with some tremendous clutch putting and an unbelievable chip shot.

With just three holes left in the regulation 18, Miss Circo, the 1973 state girls champion, led by two, but Mrs. Travnicek won the 18th and the 17th holes to square the match heading to the 18th. Each played two shots short of the lake on the final hole, but Mrs. Travnicek had the poorer shot to the par 5 green.

"I needed a three-wood for distance (to the green)," she said, "but I went to my four-wood to make sure I would get it up over the lake from the downhill lie." PRESSURE ON

She put the shot some 80 yards short of the green and Miss Circo put the pressure on by putting her third just off the putting surface with a beautiful long iron shot.

Mrs. Travnicek's nine-iron was some 20 yards shot of the green and she was forced to hit again, her fifth shot. It looked like the match.

"I knew I had to hole out," she said, "I didn't even consider getting close because I knew she would get down in five."

With flag pulled, she chipped on to the green and as if it had eyes the ball went straight into the cup. The gallery of near 200 excitedly applauded its approval for the tremendous effort. When Miss Circo made her five the towsome moved to the first tee for sudden-death.

Each reached the green in four, Mrs. Travnicek with a medium iron and a 30foot putt remaining, and Miss Circo with a beautiful bunker shot and a two-foot poke.

Can lightning strike twice?

It did!

Putting downhill, Mrs. Travnicek read the break perfectly and rammed it home for a par. Miss Circo followed suit.

In the only poorly played of the four extra holes, Mrs. Travnicek missed a 3½ footer which would have won the match on number two Each took a bogey five.

The missed putt on number two looked like the match when after Mrs. Travnicek put her iron on the par three number three 30-feet away Miss Circo knocked her ball to within 18 inches with a magnificant golf shot.

The youngster was playing like a veteran, while the veteran scrambled.

Lightning then struck an unbelievable third time as Mrs. Travnicek again read the break and put the down-hill put right in the middle of the cup. The gallery went wild. The undaunted Miss Circo countered with her duece and on to the par 5 fourth hole.

Mrs. Travnicek immediately found trouble as she put her drive into a fairway bunker. Miss Circo placed her drive in the middle of the fairway. With her ball in the water in the trap from morning rains. Mrs. Travnicek got a free drop and responded with an excellent iron shot from the bunker.

Each eventually reached the area of the green in three shots, Miss Circo on the front edge, 40-feet from the cup and Mrs. Travnicek just off the back of the putting surface 50-feet away. An excellent chip shot put her ball three feet from the hole in four.

It looked again like a dead heat.

But Miss Circo putted 15-feet past the hole and just missed coming back, opening the door for her opponent.

Mrs. Travnicek quietly took advantage of the second chance and shut the door with her par putt.

An appreciative gallery which had followed the twosome through the four extra holes loudly applauded their appreciation for the excellent show.

Undoubtedly one of the best in the 57year history of the tournament.

Marge Smith hits hole-in-one
